PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

Eviction Prevention Case Resolution Program

The Eviction Prevention Case Resolution Program is a powerful tool for preventing homelessness and has been recognized by the Pennsylvania Housing Alliance for its effectiveness. Our teams of attorneys, court coordinators, and housing navigators negotiate with landlords, represent tenants at court, provide rental assistance, and where necessary, help tenants locate new, more affordable housing.

91% of households maintained their housing

Family Center

The Family Center is the only low-barrier family shelter in Chester County that provides housing for entire families in private apartments. This model allows families to stay together, rather than requiring dads and adolescent boys be sheltered separately. New programs, including weekly life skills and job readiness workshops, were created to meet family needs and enhance self-sufficiency.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS continued

Housing Stability Case Management

The Housing Stability Case Management Program supports families currently in permanent housing with the goal of preventing homelessness. The program continues to grow, offering comprehensive support to families facing housing instability or homelessness and those recently transitioning from shelters back to permanent housing. Services include advocacy, education, resource coordination, and life skills training, all designed to empower families living in the community. Friends Association's HSCM team expands our collaboration with partner agencies, offering more resources and fostering increased independence for families.

100% of families remained housed for at least 12 months

NIA House

NIA House is part of the SAFE Housing Network for women who are impacted by incarceration. This safe housing program provides holistic reentry services for women returning to their community while giving them the space they need to re-establish critical bonds with their children, and secure long-term stable housing after a period of incarceration.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS continued

Emergency Rental Assistance Program (ERAP) and ERAP Case Management

The Emergency Rental Assistance and ERAP Case Management Programs were created in response to the pandemic with funding from The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021 and the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The programs provided crucial financial support to individuals and families facing a decrease in household income or financial hardship. ERAP funding has wound down, however some of our ERAP families continue to receive case management services focused on housing stability, life skills development, and landlord-tenant mediation. Families are referred to partner agencies for financial counseling to support long-term stability.




Friends Association is able to prevent and end homelessness for Chester County families because of the generous investment of our community of donors and funding partners.

MISSION

Friends Association provides programs and services that prevent homelessness and promote the independence of families with children.

APPROACH:

- **Housing First** – Families are moved as quickly as possible to new, permanent housing, preventing the stress and trauma of multiple temporary accommodations.
- **Trauma-Informed** – Poverty and homelessness are traumatic experiences, especially for children. We incorporate trauma-informed principles into all we do, from the way we work with families to the design of our Family Center.
- **2-Generation Solutions** – We focus on the whole family, providing support to children and parents alike, to build their resilience and help break generational patterns that perpetuate poverty and homelessness.
